Sieur Blandin Dutertre, Plaintiff,

The Council considering the plaintiff's petition, ordered summon July 27th and 28th, last, said expositive petition in virtue of a decree by the Council July 17, 1764, by Barry, recorder to Sieur Chantalou, heretofore recorder and debtor of the sum of 78 livres 1 sol 1 denier in letter of exchange, in consequence of a sum of 575, that the late Sieur Lariviere in solido with his wife had consented by their note to order in favor of the plaintiff with power of attorney, and concluded with permit to have the defendant summoned to be sentenced to pay the plaintiff without delay the proceeds of the succession of the late Sieur Lariviere, which was deposited in his hands. The note of the late Sieur Lariviere and his wife, in favor of Sieur Dutertre of 575 livres, a power given by Sieur Lariviere's wife to Sieur Dutertre to collect the funds of the succession of her late husband from Sieur Chantalou, the judgment of the Council ordering Sr. Chantalou to pay the defendant 78 livres 1 sol 1 denier, dated January 7, 1764, at the bottom of which is the intimation of the whole minutely examined.

The Council condemned and condemns the defendant to pay the plaintiff, the sum of 78 livres 1 sol 1 denier, and condemns the Lariviere Succession for the cost.

PETITION

Jean Louis Azemar, former Attorney General of the King of the Isle de la Grenade, states the horrors of war which have deprived him of an office which he exercised with honor and distinction has put him in a state of ruin in this Colony and unable to find an office befitting his qualifications,

That he practiced law for 30 years,
That he had made application to represent some clients and that he had been insulted by the Attorney-General and upon his address he was named Curator of the succession of Dutilles, which placed him in the good graces of the Court and the Attorney General but in the beginning of March, your petitioner had the misfortune to displease Mr. de La Freniere in a petition, but could never discover the motives he could have.

A few days before the Counsel of March, that petitioner called on him and was received with an air of haughtiness and menace, warning petitioner that he wanted to encroach upon his prerogative and that he was going to give the Court a lecture against your petitioner, accusing him of rapacity statement of which he was misinformed and that petitioner could easily destroy, which obliged him to drop the accusation without however wanting to recognize the title of procurator in the lecture of March 7, 1768 in which he claimed that your petitioner was not admitted as an attorney in France and this is how he chose to humiliate him, by which he substituted the title of pleading attorney or tolerated attorney and for this reason your petitioner thanked the Court at its last meeting for favors accorded him and tendered his resignation as an Attorney, a privilege granted him gratuitously by the Attorney General.

Besides he was charged with receiving compensation from Sieur and Dame Caserese, a matter which had been settled six or seven months ago, and in which Sieur Beaufort is not admitted and for which the Attorney General had no rights according to the rules of procedure to furnish him without a hearing, and further your petitioner could easily prove his innocence to the Attorney General's charges and threats if permitted so to do.

Petitioner prays for an act of justification for these presents and the three threatening letters submitted to the Court. To give a certificate for his three commissions of Magistrate filled in Martinique and at La Granade by him and presented to the Court. Give certificate for his title of Pleading and Tolerant Attorney, to plead and represent the rights of others, declare Sieur Beaufort non-receivable in his demands for which he will be non-suited, and in consequence, the ordinance of the Attorney General will remain null and void, and non-suit the others and sentence the said Beaufort to pay all expenses.

That on May 14, 1768, under private signature, he sold to Sr. & Dame Pery, jointly, a lot of ground measuring 4 arpents front by 40 deep, situated 1/2 league above this city on the other side of the river, adjoining the property of Dame Widow Pradel on the one side, and that of purchasers on the other side. Price 4500 livres payable in five years. Of this amount 1500# is interest, which interest was to be paid 300# May 14, 1768 and every year thereafter until 1772. The principal was to be paid in full at the end of five years. The sale was later ratified by act before Garic, on June 1, 1768.

That, when purchasers defaulted on their payment this year, and petitioner asked for the money, Mr. Percy offered to give him lumber (planks) in payment and asked 2 sols per plank, whereas the prevailing market price is one escalin a plank. Petitioner therefore prays that defendants be ordered to pay the 300# past due, and should they fail to execute the order, that the 4 arpents in question be sold at auction and payment be made out of the proceeds of sale in piastres gourdes, the currency of today.

In case the proceeds are not sufficient, petitioner reserves his rights under other acts of mortgage.

(Heirs of deceased Dame Jeanne Trudeau Delapommeraye.)

And Mr. Villars, Sr., as curator and tutor to plaintiff.

Mme. Jeanne Trudeau, widow of Locquet Delapommeraye was tutor for Miguel Locquet, from May 15, 1755 to August 4, 1758. By order of August 6, 1768, defendants were condemned to render an accounting of her tutorship.

The brief quotes Article 318 of the Custom of Paris, which says that an heir is invested by the law, with all rights of deceased whom he succeeds, as well as all his charges and obligations, and on this authority plaintiff demands that the heirs of Jeanne Trudeau furnish him an accounting. Lamoignon, Art. 127. Poquet de Livernore, Regles du Droit françois, Book 1, title 2, Section 3rd, Article 34; Do. Book 4, Chapter 9, Art. 31, says that the rights of minors are settled only by formal statements and accounting furnished to minors at time of their majority;

that all transactions, receipts, releases by minors to tutors or curators before accounting is rendered, are to be considered as null and void.

No property can be turned over to a minor before his majority and accompanied by an accounting, or the person so turning over the property takes risk of having to pay twice in case property was dissipated by minor.

Villars, according to his defense of August 6, last, does not know by what act he was made curator. He alleged that Miguel Locquet was adjudicated jointly with his mother Dame Delapommeraye, some ground measuring six arpents front, for 37,100 #; that he sold this jointly with his mother, on attaining his majority, for a like sum, making his share 18550 #. To which plaintiff answers that, being a minor he not only could not have property adjudicated to him, but he could not enjoy the usufruct. Besides, if he were adjudicated this property, why did not Dame Delapommeraye give an accounting of her administration of it?

Villars also alleges that a lot of slaves were adjudicated to him. Estimated value was 25715 #. Fleuriau and Trudeau claim it was only 23025; Two of the slaves listed as adjudicated to him were adjudicated to Locquet for 4810 #, but he was acting for his mother to whom he gave them. They also claim he received an amount of 11000 # from sale of movables. He denies this. If only the defendants would furnish a statement, he could more readily refute charges made against him.

On the receipt for 16,867 # signed Delapommeraye, Trudeau (acting for De Murat) and Locquet, his signature was only ad honorer since he had not been emancipated and he did not receive a penny of this amount.

About the slaves which defendants question and which plaintiff brought from St. Domingo; he rented them from his mother until end of Nov., 1763. He borrowed 7200 # from Sr. Rivoir, and sold land to Mr. De Reggio, and with gains from their labor plus the borrowed money paid for the negroes he had bought on credit and produces a receipt in form of Letters of Exchange for 825 # and one receipt for 16000 #, which was paid to Dame Delapommeraye on Nov. 22, 1763.

Private Signature

While the law requires that mortgages must be before Notary and must be dated, this rule does not invalidate an undated act under private signature even if not in handwriting of the undersigned, provided there is written in own handwriting at bottom of act "handwriting approved". Declaration of July 30, 1734.

He quotes Louet, Letter T. Chap. 3, Le Prêtre Centurie, 1^{re} Chap. 25. Delamoignon, "Tutorship", Article 127. "Regles de Droit françois" by Livoniere, Book 1, title 2, Section 2, article 34. A minor's rights are not governed by conjectures but by bona fide accounting, and the tutor and curator are not allowed to compromise on any of the accounts or items before rendering the statement.

Plaintiff then takes up all the charges made against him by Fleuriau and Trudeauu. Among them are: Undue influence brought to bear on his mother; getting money from her, etc; illegal adjudication of lands, and winds up with demand that the other heirs who were majors at time of tutorship of his mother, be forced to give an account of her administration.

He also questions and contests some of the acts passed between Dame Jeanne Trudeau and some of the heirs. For instance - a sum of 5100# paid Villars as a settlement in the estate of Guerin Delapommeraye, an absent brother, and to overcome any probability that the absent brother might return and claim his inheritance, when the amount was given it, the word "Father" was substituted for "Brother" in the act.

Plaintiff claims his paternal inheritance is 64,060# and it is the accounting of the administration of this property he is demanding.
