YEAR 1729AUGUST 6ANSWER OF CHARLES ROGER, FORMER
STOREKEEPER FOR MR. CROZAT, RE-
FUTING THE ATTORNEY GENERAL'S
CHARGES OF DISHONESTY

(This case was begun on July 28, 1727).*

Charles Roger maintains that the account of Guenot Brothers, Massy, and Dubreuil, of Mobile, is true and correct, as shown on his journal of accounts, and ledger; that he made no misrepresentations to the company; that the account of the widow of the elder Sieur Guenot was left with Sieur Chausson, attorney in Paris, together with a statement abstracted from books kept by the late Sieur Guenot, showing merchandise delivered to this company by Roger, without any special receipt, but against a credit of 5000 to 6000 livres afforded said company by Mr. Crozat; that according to agreement, if said credit proved satisfactory, the doubling thereof was obtainable.

That service of notice upon Roger by Massy and the Guenot brother, heir, was unnecessary, for they were well aware of their inability to exhibit the hereinbefore mentioned statement, which was faithfully executed, and registered in Paris. As a matter of fact, Roger also registered a bill of exchange for 300 livres, drawn by Sieur St. Martin upon Mr. Dishaye, the company's cashier in Paris,

and endorsed by Sieurs Bienville, Delorme, and Legay, which bill of exchange is protested, and which, upon his return, Roger transferred to Mr. Theobonne, who tendered it in payment of his indebtedness to the company.

The foregoing statements will be corroborated by Mr. Ducho (who is in France, by Mr. Crozat, and by Sieur Blanchard, the company's clerk and Mr. Crozat's former secretary.

The King's attorney claims that Roger hid the books, books of account, etc., which he kept in his own style, and exhibits only new ones which he has heavily padded with expenses of the King, the company and others.

Roger alleges that his records contain no dissimulation or diversion; that, evidently, deception has been practiced upon the Attorney General, since it is a fact that, heretofore, he has received no summons, not even from the members of his Majesty's Council.

Roger admits having released merchandise without orders or remittances. Mr. Crozat never instructed him to demand them, and it was not customary at that time; moreover, he had no clerk to prepare receipts for each article delivered. His departure for France was announced 4 or 5 months before, by the Rector of Mobile, after the Mass on three different Sundays, stating that settlement of accounts was urged.

Complainants submit no written statements, show no quantity, quality, weight, measure, arrears, etc., but claim that Roger failed to deliver the goods charged to them.

Regarding Rossard, clerk, who constitutes himself a party against Roger, and presents no written statement of his imaginary shortage of merchandise, he should know that a responsible agent is not censured by discourses, but by documentary facts.

Roger has not attempted to deceive the King, as stated by the Attorney General; this was an impossibility, for he never had charge of his Majesty's property, nor had he the honor of being in his service; he merely made payments conformably to vouchers provided for this purpose, and has no knowledge of being erroneous therein; if such were the case, said errors are exceptable, for he does not consider himself above experts, who are subject to grave errors.

It is but lawful to demand that complainants set forth their grievances in writing, and allow Roger to present his defense. He alleges that his trade-book and ledger are true and just; that they were kept to the best of his ability. Said books have been in the hands of the company nine months, have been exhibited at several assemblies, and no fault found.

Wherefore, Roger requests that the auditing of his books be assigned to an experienced person, and not to an indiscreet amateur. He is prepared to submit every document requested, excepting "a sort of ledger" pertaining to various settlers, which he either mislaid while employed as cashier, or left at the Louisiana Registry Office for certification of Sieur Rossard's account. He, furthermore, suspects attempts to appropriate same to his detriment, and although it is of no value, he suggests that said book be recovered.

TO REPLEVIN GRANTED
SIEURS MASSY AND GUENOT

Opponent alleges that said replevin, obtained from His Majesty's Privy State Council, resulted from a deception of the Council and the company by Sieurs Massy and Guenot; that he will later deliver receipt and acknowledgment of the late Sr. Guenot, which documents are presently in France with Sr. Chausson. He denies all charges of the King's Attorney and solicits the Council's investigation of his records, which are intelligible, orderly, and will tend to speed instead of delay procedure of auditors. He is being accused without the privilege of submitting documentary evidence.

Wherefore, he demands that the company shall not desist from its operations until the aforesaid deception is clearly proven; that an order issue for the search of inventories, invoices, etc., which he delivered to the Council; that he be furnished copies of documents registered by the late Sr. Guenot; also a copy of inventory of his records prepared by Mr. De Villadeau, to more adroitly balance his accounts; and that he be relieved from proceedings of the King's attorney, until proof of his malfeasance is undeniably established.

INFORMATION BROUGHT
BY ATTORNEY GENERAL FLEURIAU.

The Attorney General for the King related that thefts of chickens, etc., still persist despite continual attempts to check this practice. About 15 days ago Sr. Rossard's young heifer was killed and eaten by negroes; 2 days ago Sr. Bonnaud was victimized in like manner. Four negroes belonging to various inhabitants have been arrested; unquestionably, they are the consumers, since the stolen meat, as well as kettles and other utensils, were found in their possession.

Wherefore, it is requested that the Council order the interrogation of said imprisoned negroes, who shall be informed of the thefts and killings of said cattle; and that after the required preliminaries, they be prosecuted until final judgment.

Interrogation of Negro Changereau.

This negro, accused of theft, being unable to speak French, was allowed the services of Jean Pinet as his interpreter, through whom the Council obtained the following information:

Said negro is named Changereau, he is a native of Bambara, about 20 years of age, and belongs to Adrien Gilbert. He ran away 10 days ago because he was underfed, and is seeking a living as a field laborer. He has been hiding in the woods with three companions, he and his friend belonging to Adrien Gilbert, the others belonging one each to Sieurs Manade and Dalby. All four had planned to run away. The disputed heifer was killed by Manade's negro, but he ate some of it. He denies stealing chickens and hogs from the plantations, and also denies having flour in his possession.

The interpreter certifies that the hereinabove statements have been truthfully and correctly read to suspect; states that he is unable to write, and can not sign.

Interrogation of Negro Francois.

On answers to inquiries the following information is obtained:

The accused is named Francois, an unbaptized slave belonging to Sieur de St. Julien, and appears to be about 25 years of age; he is not a fugitive, having been sent into the City on an errand by his master. He found a sack of bacon belonging to Sr. Faucon and took a portion, which he gave to an unknown negro in exchange for tobacco; he was subsequently, arrested; he realizes that he did wrong, but took no part in cattle killing and stealing, as he arrived in city only day before yesterday.

The present interrogation having been read to said Francois, he verifies it, and declares his inability to write.

Slave of Sr. Dalby.

Accused is unable to speak French, Jean Pinel, his interpreter, reports as follows:

His name is Pierrot, apparently about 27 or 28 years of age, a native of Bambara, belonging to Sr. Dalby.

He has been a fugitive ten days. Shortly before he was sent by his master to Sr. Manadé, surgeon, to have a boil on his neck lanced; but was recalled, termed a loafer, and ordered back to work while still ill. The painfulness of his wound, coupled with the threat of being tied up for inability to work, caused him to run away.

Questioned as to his participation in the theft of 2 heifers and a cow, he relates that a young beast (sic) which was brought to them by Sr. Manadé's negro, was killed by him and a negro belonging to Mr. Adrien (sic), they hurriedly partook of the meat for they feared the approach of savages, which actually occurred; the 2 negroes belonging to Srs. Manadé and Dalby, having perceived them took flight, but he and Adrien Gilbert's negro were arrested. He had no knowledge of other cattle-killings, nor did he steal chickens from the Jesuits; however, he did take some corn from their plantation for food.

The present interrogation was read to the interpreter, who repeated it to Pierrot and reported his admission of the truth thereof and his persistence therein; he also states that neither of them know how to sign.

Interrogation of Negro Sabany
Slave of Officer Villamille

Interpreter Jean Pinet reports as follows:

Sabany is name of accused, he appears to be about 30 years of age, is a native of Bambara, and the property of Officer Villamille. He is not a fugitive, and did not participate in the theft of 2 heifers and a cow. On yesterday he was given some fresh meat by two of his friends, whom he met in one of Sr. de Bienville's cabins.

When asked could he identify the fugitive negroes and name their masters, he replied that there were four, of whom two took to flight, and the two who were arrested remained with him. He is unaware that these negroes were wanted for theft; one of those at large, belonging to Sr. de Manadé, was fed by him in his cabin. He was not visited by those arrested.

The interpreter, after reading thereof, repeats the present interrogation to accused, who certifies to its truthfulness, and declares his inability to write.

Accused requires the services of an interpreter, which services are rendered by Molene, another negro, who reports as follows:

Prisoner is named David, a native of Bambara, unbaptized, apparently 22 years of age, property of Sr. de Manadé. He ran away because his master broke one of his fingers, causing him to remain disabled, and then accused him of not knowing how to cleave wood.

They were five negroes who partook of the heifer; only one heifer was killed, and it was consumed by them. One of said negroes is in prison, one in the Hospital with a sore jaw; the others belong to a French boat-builder. They took one chicken from the Jesuits. The heifer was stolen on a Sunday night. Two or three moons have waned since his flight.

The present interrogation is read to interpreter and is repeated by him to accused, who acknowledges the truth thereof and declares his inability to write.

Will probably have to share expenses with someone else, thereby sending hams with other merchandise on hand. Should one of the Company's boats arrive, the freight may be loaded thereon.

Inquiries are forthcoming for green serge. Replied that some was expected, but quoted no price.

Brewed 1-1/4 bbls. of native wine, was firmly resolved to preserve it untouched until next Spring, however, succumbed to temptation on St. Martinmas Day, although the product was still tart. The barrel shall remain in Camp until Easter. To avoid weakening on Epiphany and Shrove Tuesday (spelled "Marty Gras" in original text) he thinks of absenting himself.

Such articles as sugar, coffee and other trifles are desirable for amusement in so isolated a spot.

P. S. The 1/4 bbl. of wine lasted five days.

Petitioner alleges that in the apportionment of slaves made in the month of May, 1728, he was given a negro from the cargo of the "Duc de Noailles"; that said negro refused to work and remained in his cabin until the end of October of that year, receiving medicines and the best of care; that he was then sent to "the desert" under an overseer who neither by coaxing or by force could get any work from him; that said overseer told petitioner that the negro had once belonged to Sr. de La Tour Pouilladon, who could do nothing with him and had given him back to the Company; that petitioner immediately took up the matter with Sr. Perier, but that the negro has since died.

Wherefore petitioner prays that there be judgment in his favor, condemning the Succession of Sr. Latour to replace the negro in question, with another to be chosen by petitioner.
