The trunk formerly belonging to decedent, which had been left in the care of Sr. Rossard, in his capacity of Administrator of Vacant Successions, was opened under an order of the Council issued on the petition of said Administrator, dated January 4, 1731.

The inventory of the contents of said trunk as well as of other property of decedent was taken by Sieurs Prat, Fleuriau, and Rossard, in his capacity of Notary Public.

The effects inventoried included wearing apparel, a silver spoon, fork and cup and silver buckles; six chairs and a trunk; a portfolio in which were found a Treasury note for 30 livres, a promissory note of Chevalier de Louboy for 313 livres (maturity date not shown), a notarial act evidencing an obligation of the Widow Jarry for 1300 livres (maturity not shown), and memoranda showing various other sums due decedent, but

seemingly not evidenced by promissory notes.

YEAR 1731JAN. 22 & 24RETROCESSION OF LOUISIANA TO THE
KING BY THE COMPANY OF THE WEST.

An extract from the Register of the deliberations taken by the General Assembly of the Administration, January 22, 1731, reveals that by an edict of August, 1717, there was organized the Company of the West, for the promotion of the commerce of the Colony of Louisiana. This company was to increase and improve upon the various forms of cultivation and planting, and to strengthen them. Also to bring to Louisiana a sufficient number of colonists.

Sieur H. Antoine Crozat, to whom the executive management of this Company had been assigned by letters patent of the King of France, Sept. 14, 1712, for a period of fifteen years, had just relinquished to the king that privilege, for the reason among others, that the proposed extent of the business throughout the vast expanse of the colony, was beyond the strength and ability of one individual.

His Majesty the King, in addition to the privileges already mentioned, further granted to the Company of the West, all lands comprised in the boundaries of the Colony, as well as the country of the Illinois tribe of Indians, then part and parcel of the Province of Louisiana, along with various other rights, property, franchises and exemptions. The enjoyment of those grants was at first limited to twenty-five years by the edicts of August, 1717, and May 1719, and later declared in perpetuity by an edict of July 1720, and confirmed in perpetuity in June, 1726.

Following a period of more than thirteen years of existence, the Company of the West represented

to the king that, after complying to the letter with the terms and conditions set forth by His Majesty for the operation of that Company, and after having brought into the Colony an even greater number of negroes than was required, educating them for better things and greater achievement; clearing a large number of lands, which multiplied itself from year to year; after building forts at various places, supplying them with artillery and even a standing army of considerable size, it had even built a city - New Orleans - situated most favorably on the banks of a river - this to make it the principal city of the Colony and the seat of the government.

That in the face of all of the existing facts, the Company of the West, in the past thirteen years, had spent far in excess of Twenty Million Dollars for the colonization of Louisiana; that in spite of such great expense, and regardless of their wise precaution in establishing missions among the savages, the company last year had the misfortune of learning of the sudden uprising of the Natchez tribe at the post bearing that name - one of the tribes of the colony whose cultivation was thriving the most. That what it felt more keenly was the massacre of almost all of the inhabitants; that such a sad occurrence could not otherwise but inspire in the company a feeling of just fear, and make it keenly apprehend the danger of a recurrence, and its inability to forewarn.

Therefore, in consideration of these facts, the company felt itself duty-bound to petition his Majesty that he no longer consider the colony as a grant in perpetuity, but only in the light of a precious trust placed in its care; that realizing its own weakness and inability to protect the colony against all hazards of the future, in further delaying the return of the colony to the king, the company would have to reproach itself forever after for continuing to incur enormous

expenses, in prejudice to its business and its stockholders.

Wherefore, the Company petitions His Majesty, that he may order the re-annexation to his domain of the province of Louisiana, together with the country of the Illinois tribe, the guardianship of which has gone beyond the company's resources.

Further, that he grant the Company of the West only the exclusive privilege of doing business in the colony; that the company shall furnish the inhabitants of Louisiana, delivered at the customary price, a quota of 500 negroes a year, furnishing them all they might require, OR (for the greater good of the company.)

Grant to the Company of the West, its retrocession of the privilege of exclusive business, the company in exchange obligating itself to furnish His Majesty some equivalent compromise, such as may be determined by arbitration of his Council; and in consequence of such compromise and retrocession, the company shall have no further control of this business in any shape or form. Furthermore, to permit the company to exercise its right and privilege as a creditor towards its debtors; in brief, to continue to extend to it the same consideration and protection it had had the honor to enjoy.

KING OF FRANCE.

At a meeting of the Syndics and Directors of the Company of the West, a message transmitted by the King to the Controller General, was read to the assembly in the following tenor:

That following the deliberations taken by the Company of the West, and later submitted to the King, asking His Majesty to revoke his grant to the company of the colony of Louisiana, the company relinquishing all of its rights, privileges, etc, etc.

The King sent a message to the company, wherein he agreed to fix the sum of 3,600,000 livres, that being the amount estimated to be the equivalent of the consideration offered in compromise, payable in the course of ten years, in instalments. Further request was made that another assembly be called by the company to accept and ratify this proposal.

Due to lack of evidence and other impediments, the investigation was deferred.

Petitioner now requests that Council hold an audition of the oldest and most notable inhabitants of the colony at this time; suggesting among others, the names of Messrs. Lafrenière, Carière, Sr., Joseph Girardy and Trudeau.

Petitioner further states that Mr. de Bienville, who had charge of the previous inquiry, had prepared certificates, but those documents were lost; however, Messrs. de Bienville, de Boisbriant and D'Artaguet, presently in France, having seen the birth of the Colony, could authenticate his statements.

ACT OF PARTNERSHIP

Sieur Charles Petit de Livilliers, officer, and dame Louise de Malbec, his wife, by him authorized, owners of a plantation, situated on the Mississippi River, near the Cannes Bruleés, by notarial act, entered into partnership with Monsieur Anthoine de Salvvert, Esquire, lieutenant of the king's vessels at present at New Orleans, for the ownership of said plantation.

An estimate and appraisement of the said plantation, its negroes, cattle, and everything pertaining to it, taken by Sieur Massy, concessionary and syndic of the colonists, on March 9th, for the purpose of drawing said deed, showed a valuation of 34.134 livres to which were added 10.000 livres, the value of ten negroes and negresses, proceeding from the last allotment, making a total of 44134 livres for the capital of said partnership.

The said agreement, for profit and loss, is for the term of five years complete, beginning as of this day, sieur de Salvvert being the owner of one fourth; sieur and dame Petit owning the other three fourths of the capital stock as well as the same proportion of the crops of said plantation, whether in grain, vegetables, tobacco or any other produce, together with the proceeds and revenues accrued from any enterprise that may be undertaken later on by Sieur and dame Petit.

All accounts of said crops, products and enterprises shall be kept in good and due form in a

day book. Sieur de Salvvert has, this day, paid to the partnership the sum of 5000 livres the value of five of the ten negroes and the balance amounting to 6033 livres, sieur de Salvvert has now paid to sieur and dame Petit who acknowledges receiving them. By the said payment, sieur de Salvvert becomes owner of one fourth of the said plantation, negroes, cattle, and of everything mentioned and listed in the inventory and appraisal which sieur and dame Petit acknowledges having sold to him to enjoy in full ownership.

Sieur Petit binds himself to manage the said plantation and to render every year to Sieur Salvvert or to his order, an account of the net profits of the plantation and enterprises, said profits to be divided namely; three-fourths to Sieur and Dame Petit and one-fourth to Sieur Salvvert. Sieur Salvvert having assumed, for the benefit of the partnership, an obligation dated March 3rd for the value of the other five negroes, which are part of the capital stock of sieur and dame Petit, the said sieur and dame Petit bind themselves, by the present to pay from the proceeds of their three quarter share, said amount to the partnership, on receipt and discharge of Sieur Salvvert, so that he would not be disquieted or annoyed having already paid his fourth share in full.

Sieur and Dame Petit will be allowed to make any increases or improvements they will deem necessary on the said plantation, whether in negroes, cattle or otherwise, said increase to be credited one-fourth to Sieur de Salvvert and three-fourths to Sieur and Dame Petit.

If before or at the expiration of the partnership term one of the partners wishes to withdraw, it is agreed that another estimation and

It is agreed that should one of the partners wish to dispose of his share or a portion of it, to avoid any contestation, he shall give the other the preference.
