The said sum is payable in three payments of 4000, 4000 and 5000 livres before the end of the years 1749, 1750, and 1751 respectively.

The mortgagor is a resident of the Illinois Post, but it is stipulated that, in the event of non-payment, service of process may be made on him either at that place or at New Orleans, for which service he declares that the house of Mr. Aufreere is his residence in New Orleans.

RECEIPT AND DISCHARGE

Dominique Daspit, known as St. Amant, now emancipated, son of the late Jean Francois Daspit, known as St. Amant and Marie Francoise Debuisson, late wife by second marriage of Sieur Antoine Meullion, by notarial act, acknowledges receiving from Sieur Antoine Meullion, his curator, the sum of 1821 livres 18 sols 2 deniers, in full settlement of his share of his father and mother's succession; said sum paid as follows:

1500 livres given by Sieur Meullion to his brother Pierre Daspit, known as Saint Amant, in payment for a negress named Lizette, whom he had bought from him and 321 livres 18 sols 2 deniers cash in current species; giving Sieur Meullion full receipt and discharge; said receipt to be deposited at the Registry Court of the Superior council of the province of Louisiana.

Declaration of Jean Deslandes to the effect that one of his cows was stolen by two slaves belonging to Sr. Jourdain; that slaves of Sr. Deslandes discovered the thieves in the act of curing the meat, the skin of said cow being afterwards found near the meat, behind the Dupar place. Deslandes tried with his men to capture the thieves, who were armed, but they ran away and he claims he was obliged to shoot, seriously wounding one of them, whom they captured and put in prison, after attending to his wounds.

Dame Rasteau declared under oath that she had not diverted any of the effects of said Succession and that she had no knowledge that any had been diverted.

The property inventoried consisted in part of household furniture and furnishings, wearing apparel; 2 kegs of nails, scrap iron, tobacco, a compass, a hammock; silverware, silver garter buckles, silver spurs, 2 pairs of pistols, 10 books, in bad condition, written in French, English, "Dutch" and Spanish; 6 slaves, and numerous documents, journals, books of account, statements, memoranda of indebtedness, promissory notes and drafts, showing numerous debtors of Sr. Rasteau, among whom are the following:

In the year one thousand, seven hundred and forty-eight, and the tenth day of June, at three o'clock in the afternoon, at the request of the first general to the king, plaintiff and accuser of various negroes accused of theft, being detained in the prison of this city,

We, Nicolas Chauvin de la Frénière, commissary for the Superior Council of Louisiana in this section, accompanied by the Clerk of the Council, and there had brought to us by the jailer of the said prison, a negro slave belonging to Sieur Dubreuil, for the purpose of proceeding with his examination, as follows:

Questioned regarding his name, his nationality, if he had been christened, and who was his master, he said:

He was named Louis; was a negro slave belonging to Sieur Dubreuil, aged about 18 years; creole born, having both father and mother at home of Sr. Dubreuil; that he was christened. He took an oath to tell the truth.

Questioned as to why he was in prison, he answered: That the Major had him put there because his name was Louis, but that he knew of no other reason.

Questioned as to how long he had been in prison, he replied three days. Questioned regarding his trade with his master, he answered that his master, having had him learn surgery, he was at that then; and that he was also working at the hospital of the king for his instruction.

(cont'd)

Interrogated regarding his whereabouts from midnight of Thursday to Friday, last, he replied, that he had seen at his master's home a negress named Angelique, who had gone to the Bayou to do some washing, and that she had her menses then, and they had stopped on her. That same day his master sent him after Baptiste at the hospital so that he might bleed her; that having bled her at the foot and also at the arm, it kept him by her all that night.

Questioned as to whether he had been of the number of those who had gone to Maret Sergent to rob him, he answered "no"; that he had never robbed anyone; that they could verify this with the sisters, at whose home he had lived a long time. He had not robbed anyone else either; that even the little negress, who had accused the other negroes of his master, will not admit having ever seen him, even though she accused the two others in the presence of the jailer himself, and that he had been put in prison only because of his name.

This examination was read to the accused who replied that he intended to go to Madame Aufrères house, his mistress, because his master was ill-treating him; so much so, he had lost the sight of one eye; and further that he has a companion, who is passing blood from the bladder.

Questioned as to whether he had met up with anyone on the road, he replied that his companion had seen some savages above the river, at Margot, but that he only heard them, as he could not see. Asked if the savages had spoken to them, he answered yes, but that he did not understand their language.

Asked if he believed them to be numerous, he replied that his companion had told him there were seven or eight, but that he did not see them.

Questioned as to whether he went ashore where the savages were, he answered, no; asked if he had ever stolen any food on the road, or killed any cattle, he replied, no; that he had taken nothing on the road; he had only the food he had brought with him from his master's house. Asked who had had him arrested at Pointe Coupée, he replied that it was Nicolas de la Cour; that at that time he was at the leeway; that his companion was asleep, and that he was sitting down.

Questioned re Nicolas de La Cour having embarked in a pirogue to make their capture, answered "yes"; that he had given them something to eat, and had led them to the fort.

Questioned regarding the number of days he had been at Pointe Coupée, when Mr. Pontalba took them down, he answered they had remained there nearly eight days.

The present examination was read to him. He claims the replies herein made are the truth, and he declares he is unable to either write or read.
