OF SIEURS PREVOST AND DREUX,
ADMINISTRATORS OF THE CHARITY HOSPITAL.

To Mr. Dabbadie, Director-General and Commandant
for the King in the Province of Louisiana.

Monsieur:

Messrs. Jean Baptiste Prevost and Matturin Dreux,
exercising the functions of Administrators of
the institution, very respectfully represent to
you that on the 1st of April, 1743, a site of
50 toises front on the cemetery by a depth of
100 toises, was granted to build a hospital, un-
der the title of "St. John"; that said establish-
ment was made as the hospital stands at present,
under the supervision of the Rev. Father Charles,
and with many donations collected by him; that
since the said institution has been completed
three-quarters of the land granted to it has been
confiscated for the necessary enclosing and forti-
fication of the City, and only about twenty-six
toises of depth remain of the original hundred
specified in the deed of grant hereto attached,
(or a copy thereof); that the space taken formed
a garden and part of the poultry yard of said insti-
tution, with some outbuildings which had to be de-
molished, or moved away at the expense of the insti-
tution, so that there does not remain enough space
for a garden and poultry yard large enough for a
hospital; that upon a verbal statement of the Ad-
ministrators, regarding retrenchment of the site,
made at the General Meeting of August 5th last,
you were kind enough to pay regard to it by
pledging yourself to grant to the Almshouse a

piece of land on the Rampart to be taken between said institution and the City Gate, and to be enclosed on the front and both sides, to replace the land confiscated, which compels us, Your honor, with respect to pray that you be kind enough to have a report made showing the area and location of the site which may be granted to said institution, and to have the deed of grant drawn up with whatever reservations you may deem proper.

We, as well as the poor, in whose behalf we are acting, will continue to pray God in Heaven for Your health and prosperity.

INDUCTION OF REVEREND FATHER DAGOBERT
TO THE CURACY OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH
OF ST. LOUIS IN NEW ORLEANS.

Reverend Father Dagobert, de Longory, former Superior of the Missions, under the guidance of the Reverend Fathers Capuchins, of the province of Champagne (France), having been granted, by Reverend Father Hilaire de Geneveaux, a Commission, dated September 18th., last, with the title of Superior of the Missions of Louisiana, giving him power and authority to take full charge and control of the Curacy of the parochial church of St. Louis in New Orleans, including all its taxes, duties, excise, privileges appartenances and dependencies.

Appeared before Sieur Garic, royal notary and chief clerk of the Superior Council of Louisiana, for the purpose of having said Commission and Grant recorded, to take its effect, in pursuance of an order issued the day before by the Superior Council, in session.

Said Commission and Grant, been immediately recorded, Rev. Father Dagobert and Sieur Garic notary, at 8:30 in the morning October 7th., repaired to the parochial church for the purpose of inducting Father Dagobert to the said Benefice.

Were present Messrs Lafreniere, Attorney General, Delaplace, his assistant Cantrelle and Jacquelin, church-wardens, Dreux, Hushet de Kernion, Le Bretton, Aubry, and other persons of note, all residents of the parish of St. Louis.

The notary, having read the said deed of Commission and Grant, and the decree of the Superior Council, ordering the recording of said deed, the Reverend Father Eustache, the last possessor of said benefit proceeded to the induction of Reverend Father Dagobert to the corporal true and actual possession of the curacy of the parochial church of St. Louis, by a free and quiet entry into the said church both wearing the stole taking holy Water, praying to God before the High Altar, kissing the Altar, visiting the Tabernacle and Holy Vases, touching the Desk, the baptismal Fonts and the Pulpit, ringing of the Bells. Sitting at the place reserved for the rector of the said church and by other ceremonies and formalities usually required on such rites.

After the singing of the Te Deum, the above deed of Induction was read before all present, no one protesting.

Certificate of the foregoing proceedings granted to Reverend Father Dagobert at his request; his original deed of Commission and Grant also remitted to him.

PETITION FOR PARTITION OF A PORTION OF LAND, WHICH WAS GRANTED TO SIEUR JACQUES LIVET.

Humbly petitions Jacques Livet, stating for the past seven and one-half years, he has cleared and cultivated together with his brothers George and François, a piece of land measuring 24 arpents, descending the river on the same side as New Orleans, eight leagues away; but, that to-day, they had agreed unanimously between them, to separate the plantation in three equal parts of 8 arpents each and work them for their own account.

In virtue of the King's power vested in you, may it please you to accord and consider, in the name of his majesty, 8 arpents of ground facing the river by the depth it may have, adjoining Nicolas Gaulois, on one side, and on the other side that of François Livet, to enjoy quietly as well as his heirs or assigns, given as something belonging to them, submitting the said petitioner to observe what it will please you to prescribe concerning the culture, is the grace he expects from your bounty.

September 10th, 1764

I, the undersigned, upon the return of L'Anglois, certify that the Livet brothers are in partnership on 24 arpents of ground facing the river by 40 arpents deep on the New Orleans side as represented by Jacques Livet, and that he can be accorded the concession of 8 arpents of his third of the ground in his name for his share

On the petition of Jacques Livet elsewhere presented to Sieur Dabbadie who died was the only obstacle to make proof tending to obtain the concession of 8 arpents facing River St. Louis or Mississippi, considering also Mr. Prevosts' certificate on the 4th of the return of l'Anglois at the **bottom** of the petition, we concede by these presents the 8 arpents, excepting title or possession other than that contrary to conditions that within a year from this day he will place a value and produce, in default of which, the term expiring it will be reunited to the kings domain, who will be **able** to dispose of it, as if the said concession had never been accorded, and **subject** to paying the taxes, if any are established in this Province.

We reserve above all for his Majesty all the necessary lumber, for the construction of forts, stores, and fortifications, and other work he may order in the future, and necessary ground for royal roads. As to the act of sale which will deliver the 8 arpents, they will be settled if not already made, by planting stakes showing the boundary to that effect.

The Brief submitted by Mr. Gardrat, acting as tutor for the Bunel minors, answering Mr. Chateau, Syndic of Creditors of Bunel Succession.

This ~~is but a part of the above entitled document and~~ contains the exposition by the acting tutor and attorney ad litem of the Bunel minors, of the fact that the late Mr. Bunel was debauched in character and these claims which are pursued by the creditors are, in large number, the result of his profligacy and that the creditors took precautions to put their claims in such form as to evade the law, which is specified as to such debts, but in this instance failed to provide for all the circumstances attending this case but which law, he believes should apply here: he then goes into detail as to the nature of the notes and written obligations given by Mr. Bunel prior to his death, as well as the kind of persons to whom these were given. As to these notes and written obligations, Mr. Gardrat defends the refusal to recognize these on the ground that these debts arise from gambling and as such are not enforceable but are voidable under the Law relating to notes governing payment of stakes. Regarding the other written obligations, Mr. Gardrat prays for a reduction on the ground that in Equity the profits accruing to the holders of these obligations are not enforceable inasmuch as these profits are beyond all reason. For example in the case of Mr. Roussillion, the profit to him ~~and~~ be the difference between 10,000# actually ~~paid~~ by him to Mr. Bunel and 80,000# which is to

be paid Mr. Roussillion on this obligation of 10,000#. Mr. Gardrat prays that this claim for said 80,000# be reduced to 10,000#, payable in former Bills of the Colony and that the claim for interest then be rejected. Concerning the further claims herein set out and detailed, Mr. Gardrat argues that these should be rejected for reasons of prescription or for lack of proper form, as the case may require. The balance of the claims set forth by the Syndic, he acknowledges as correct and declares same will be paid in the order of their respective rank. The last not requiring particular discussion are not detailed herein.

In consequence thereof I advise you to try to secure from private individuals on the most convenient terms obtainable the funds necessary to enable you to leave this port as soon as possible, as it is neither customary nor appropriate that the Royal Treasury should advance the funds you request.

Examination

Pursuant to an order of Honorable D'Abbadie, Director General, Commandant of Louisiana and First Judge of the Superior Council, issued on petition of Honorable Foucault, Comptroller of the Navy, Honorable DeLaunay proceeded to the examination of Sieur Coue, accused of abuse of confidence and swindling.

After being put under oath, and interrogated, he stated his name was Francois Coue, sixty years of age, employed as clerk in the Navy office of this city.

A number of statements and invoices, about eighteen bearing his signatures, for merchandise, provisions, liquor, tallow, etc., supplied and delivered to the King's stores during the years 1757 and 1758 were produced and laid before him for his examination.

Upon the first invoice, dated April 26, 1757, amounting to 64557 livres, he admitted having re-mitted, all articles mentioned, to the King's stores, but he never received the amount of it from the Treasury and the signature at the bottom receipting the bill was not his own as he never signed that way and he never received any of that money.

Questioned separately upon the contents of each and every statement and invoices, his answers were invariably the same: upon some of the others, he admitted having gone around to the different merchants of the city, bought the goods listed in the different invoices and delivered them to the King's stores, after which he received from the Treasury the amount stated in the invoices and paid the merchants.

On purchasing the merchandise, by order of Mr. Descloseaux, he received from the merchants a statement, which he brought to the office and on Mr. Descloseaux's dictation entered the prices to each and every item of purchase. The total amount drawn from the Treasury on vouchers was delivered to the merchants.

Asked to show the invoices received from the merchants, he stated he only received memorandums, which he remitted to Mr. Descloseaux for him to issue his orders.
